Introduction to Ukrainian Orthodox Church History

- A Timeline of Church History (after the Ascension)
 - Apostolic and AnteNicene Age (33-325): Pentecost, Founding of Churches, Priests, Deacons, Bishops,
 Conciliar system, Eucharistic worship, spread of the faith, development of forms
 - Age of the Seven Councils (325-787)
 - Conversion of Rus-Ukraine (988)
 - Olha became regent in 945. She was baptized in 955 in Constantinople.
 - The Story of Volodymyr and his conversion
 - Sts. Antony and Theodisiy and the caves Monastery (1062)
 - Internecine War, the Polovtsians, and capitulation to the Tartars
 - Domination by Poland and Lithuania (14th 16th Centuries)
 - False Union of Florence (1439), and the sacking of Metroplitan Isidore of Kyiv
 - Fall of Constantinople in 1453
 - (False) Union of Berest (1596) and subsequent persecution of Orthodox (low point in 1620)
 - o Saviors of Ukrainian Orthodoxy: Bratstvo, Cossacks, and other saints
 - Reinforcement of Ukrainian Orthodox Church from Constantinople (1620)
 - St. Petro Mohyla (1596 1646), Mazepa's last stand (1709), St. Paisiy Valychkivskiy (1722-1794).
 - End of the Kievan Metropolitanate, first protected by Moscow Patriarchate through a treaty with Poland (1686), then integrated (Poles had all but decimated Orthodoxy within their territory before this)
 - The Disintegration of the Russian Empire, and the attempt to re-establish an independent Ukrainian
 Orthodox Church (Sobor of 1921)
 - Lots of themes interwoven, some healthy, some less so. Quick growth
 - Communist reassertion of control and destruction of UAOC
 - More successful in Poland (1924 became Autocephalous)
 - World War Two allowed for the (healthier) re-establishment of the UOAC (until Soviets...)
 - 1991 Collapse of Soviet Union led to new hope, but soon brought down by opportunism
 - Ukrainian Orthodoxy in America: an interesting journey (and our parish is emblematic)
 - Faithful people, striving for an authentic expression of the Timeless Faith of Orthodoxy
 - Looking both backwards and forwards, but living in the Now of Christ
